On the 1st of August 2024, the President of APAL, Ms. Maya Ranavare, and the Treasurer, Mr. Prakash Done, visited the Brighter Future Development Trust (BFDT) and met with BFDT's Director, Mr. Victor Parisipogula, and Manager, Mr. Prasad Chowdary. This meeting held great significance as it signified a crucial step towards strengthening the support system for individuals affected by leprosy. The discussions revolved around several critical issues, including the necessity for improved medical support to guarantee timely and effective treatment for leprosy patients. Additionally, there was an exploration of ways to enhance nutrition support, acknowledging the significance of adequate nutrition for the overall health and well-being of those affected by leprosy.

The discussions also underscored the importance of stronger social protection measures to uphold the dignity and rights of leprosy-affected individuals. Both organizations stressed the need for social entitlements to ensure access to basic necessities and opportunities for a better quality of life. Another focal point of the discussion was education support for children living under the shadow of leprosy. Both APAL and BFDT acknowledged the importance of providing these children with educational opportunities to break the cycle of poverty and stigma associated with leprosy.

The meeting was highly productive, with both APAL and BFDT committing to future collaborative and dedicated work to address these pressing concerns. The partnership aims to create a comprehensive support system that addresses the medical, nutritional, social, and educational needs of those affected by leprosy.

On Sunday, 4th August 2024, Bishop Durgam Prabhakar, the Founder and President of Bethesda Ministries, orchestrated a compassionate blanket distribution initiative aimed at assisting 40 underprivileged families in B.B. Nagar Leprosy Colony. The occasion was graced by the esteemed presence of Bolla Venkat Reddy, Joint Nalgonda District D., and C. Yam. Yes, Chairman, who participated as the chief guest. They personally distributed blankets to the recipients, offering essential solace and warmth.

Maniyada Ramesh, State Coordinator of APAL, delivered an address during the event, shedding light on the inadequate infrastructure within the colony. He articulated concerns regarding the absence of proper drainage systems, sanitation facilities, and well-constructed roads. Furthermore, he highlighted the challenges posed by malodorous conditions and mosquito proliferation resulting from the lack of appropriate waste disposal facilities near the colony. He underscored the urgent necessity for ameliorations and pledged to actively pursue resolutions.

A delegation from the APAL's State Committee in Odisha convened with Chief Minister Jitan Ram Manjhi on Tuesday to address the dire circumstances of the numerous leprosy victims in the state. The delegation emphasized the urgent need for the government to improve living conditions for these individuals due to insufficient medical facilities and healthcare, resulting in severe hardships for many patients.

The delegation informed the Chief Minister that there are over 50 leprosy patient colonies in the state, lacking essential amenities such as clean drinking water, proper sanitation, and adequate housing. They stressed the necessity for the government to promptly address these issues and provide improved living conditions for the affected individuals.

Financial constraints prevent many patients from obtaining proper treatment, and the delegation requested the government to offer free medical care and financial assistance to these individuals. Furthermore, they urged the implementation of welfare schemes specifically benefiting leprosy patients and their families.

Assuring the delegation of the government's commitment to improving the lives of leprosy patients, Chief Minister Manjhi instructed concerned officials to promptly address the raised concerns. He also announced the government's ongoing efforts to develop a comprehensive plan for improved healthcare facilities and support for leprosy patients statewide.

The meeting, attended by various officials and members of the APAL's State Committee concluded with the representatives expressing gratitude to the Chief Minister for his swift response and assuring their support in implementing the proposed welfare schemes.




State Committee of APAL in Bihar held a significant meeting with Shriman Ganga Prasad ji, the former Governor of Meghalaya, at his residence in Patna

On the 7th of August 2024, the State Committee of APAL in Bihar held a significant meeting with Shriman Ganga Prasad ji, the former Governor of Meghalaya, at his residence in Patna. The purpose of the meeting was to request his assistance in organizing a discussion with His Excellency, the Governor of Bihar. The main agenda was to advocate for the expansion of the Bihar Satabadi Kushtha Kalyan Yojana, a welfare program designed to enhance the lives of individuals affected by leprosy.

Understanding the significance of this matter, Shri Ganga Prasad ji facilitated the request and assured the committee that the Governor of Bihar would meet with them within the next 1-2 days. This meeting marks a crucial milestone in the ongoing endeavours to secure more comprehensive support and resources for the leprosy-affected community in Bihar.

APAL's President, Maya Ranavare, recently met with the District Leprosy Officer of Sangli to address a pressing issue faced by persons affected by leprosy in the region. The discussion centered on the challenges these individuals encounter when attempting to obtain disability certificates from the government. Despite their eligibility, many struggle with bureaucratic hurdles and delays, making it difficult for them to access the benefits and support they are entitled to Maya Ranavare emphasized the need for a streamlined, efficient, and user-friendly process to ensure that all eligible individuals can obtain their certificates without unnecessary complications. She proposed that the government should implement a more systematic approach, possibly involving better coordination between medical professionals, government offices, and community organizations, to ensure that these certificates are issued promptly and fairly.

The District Leprosy Officer acknowledged the concerns and expressed a willingness to work towards simplifying the process, recognizing the importance of empowering persons affected by leprosy through easier access to their rights.

Maya Ranavare also presented the District Leprosy Officer of Sangli with APAL's annual report book for 2023-2024. This report provides a comprehensive overview of APAL's efforts and achievements over the past year, highlighting the organization's dedication to improving the lives of persons affected by leprosy. By sharing this report, Maya aimed to further inform and engage the District Leprosy Officer in APAL's ongoing initiatives, fostering greater collaboration in addressing the challenges faced by the leprosy-affected community.

He emphasized the need for improved infrastructure to ensure that the leprosy-affected individuals, who are already living in poverty, are not further marginalized. The call to action is a plea for the dignity and well-being of the residents, who deserve a better standard of living and the basic amenities that many take for granted.

On August 25, 2024, the President of APAL, Maya Ranavare, alongside the management of APAL's State Committee, held a meeting with the Governor of Odisha, Mr. Raghubar Das, at his office. During the meeting, a memorandum was presented to address a critical issue pertaining to the state's disability pension policy.

Currently, the disability pension of 3,500 rupees is exclusively provided to individuals affected by leprosy who are over 80 years old. This policy has led to the exclusion of many individuals residing in leprosy colonies, enduring significant disabilities and challenging living conditions, who do not meet the age criteria for financial assistance. These individuals, in urgent need of support, are currently deprived of essential resources for sustainable living.

APAL respectfully appealed to the Governor to consider extending the disability pension to all individuals affected by leprosy, regardless of age, by recognizing a 40% disability certificate as the eligibility criterion. This adjustment aims to address the significant gap in the current policy and ensure that pension benefits reach those most in need, thereby providing these individuals with the means to live with dignity and security. Furthermore, the delegation raised awareness of critical land issues faced by many in the leprosy-affected community, residing in unsafe and uninhabitable housing. They urged the Governor's intervention to address these urgent housing and land concerns, guaranteeing safe and stable living conditions for the vulnerable individuals.

The meeting was attended by Maya Ranavare (President of APAL), Jawahar Ram Paswan (Vice President of APAL), Prabhakar Sahoo (Executive Member of APAL), Biswanadh Sahoo (APAL's State Coordinator in Odisha), and other key members. APAL expressed profound gratitude to the Governor for his positive response and the warm hospitality extended during their visit. On 29th August 2024, The President of APAL, Maya Ranavare, was invited, alongside the APAL State Committee in Maharashtra, to attend a one-day convention organized by the Maharashtra Kushthapit Sanghatna. The event aimed to honor students who received merit scholarships through the Kusthakanth Scholarship Scheme and to welcome the Honorable President of Maharashtra Kushthapit Sanghatna. Distinguished leaders and activists dedicated to the welfare of individuals affected by leprosy and those advocating for educational opportunities for underprivileged communities convened at the gathering.

The convention hosted esteemed guests including Hon. Shri Ram Naik, Governor of Uttar Pradesh, Hon. Shri Prashant Thakur, MLA of the Panvel Legislative Assembly, and Hon. Shri Manoj Bhujbal, MLA of the Nashik Graduate Constituency, Panchvati, Maharashtra, who served as Chief Guests. Hon. Shri Uday Takar and Hon. Smt. Maya Ranavare took on the roles of Chief Guest and Program Coordinator respectively. The inauguration of the event by Hon. Shri Nitin Kadam from the Education Department of Maharashtra underscored its focus on education and empowerment.

The Maharashtra Kushthapit Sanghatna, located at Shri Ramdas Thakur Samajik Vikas Mandal in Mandve, Panvel, organized the convention under the leadership of Mr. Jitendra Chatehan, President, and Shri Ashok Ambekar, Secretary.

During the session, the organizers initiated a discussion on the necessity of an amended petition to address critical issues faced by people affected by leprosy. They proposed several key demands for inclusion in the new petition:

- 1. National Survey: Conduct a fresh national survey of all individuals affected by leprosy across the country.
- 2. National Policy: Formulate a comprehensive national policy for the empowerment and upliftment of leprosy victims.

- 3. Uniform Subsistence Allowance: Implement a uniform and genuine subsistence allowance across all states.
- 4. Free Medical Facilities: Instruct all states to provide free medical facilities to all leprosy-affected communities.
- 5. Preservation of Rights: Ensure housing and land rights are preserved for leprosy sufferers.
- 6. Free Education and Special Training: Provide free education for the children of leprosy-affected persons and offer special training for competitive government examinations.
- 7. Amendment in Personal Laws: Introduce necessary amendments in personal laws to protect the rights of those affected by leprosy.
- 8. Financial Support for Economic Activities: Provide financial support for small-scale industries and agriculture involving leprosy-affected individuals.
- 9. Tax Exemption for Products: Exempt products made by leprosy-affected persons from VAT/GST.
- 10. Public Awareness Campaign: Address misconceptions and lack of awareness about leprosy through an effective public awareness campaign.
