This event was conducted to share the findings of the research, which was carried out from March 2021 to March 2024. The program brought together various stakeholders, including representatives from the World Health Organization (WHO) India, ILEP (International Federation of Anti-Leprosy Associations), and Change Scape.

During the event, Maniyada Ramesh contributed by highlighting the challenges faced by people affected by leprosy, especially those who have migrated to urban areas in search of livelihood. His insights from Telangana provided valuable perspectives on how migration impacts access to healthcare, social protection, and sustainable living for those affected by the disease. Through his active participation, he emphasized the importance of a collaborative approach among government bodies, NGOs, and communities to ensure that individuals affected by leprosy are integrated into mainstream society with dignity and support.

The visit aimed to assess the current living conditions of the residents and review ongoing initiatives to enhance their quality of life.

During the visit, the leaders interacted with new livelihood beneficiaries who had recently received support under various government schemes. This commendable initiative aims to alleviate the financial difficulties encountered by those who depend on these pensions for their basic needs and overall well-being. The delegation's proactive engagement highlights their commitment to securing dignity and financial stability for individuals affected by leprosy and disabilities.

The advocacy for an increase in these pensions represents a critical and necessary measure towards addressing disparities in social support systems across India. While regions such as Delhi, Telangana, and Haryana provide pensions of Rs 3,000 per month, and Maharashtra offers a disability pension of Rs 2,500 in addition to a municipal allowance of Rs 4,000, Madhya Pradesh significantly trails behind with a mere Rs 600. In contrast, Andhra Pradesh exemplifies progressive policy by providing a disability pension of Rs 6,000 and additional support for individuals experiencing more than 80% disability. This stark disparity underscores the urgent need for uniform and equitable pension policies that ensure all individuals, regardless of their geographic location, receive adequate financial assistance to sustain a dignified standard of living.

Mr. Gayadhane and his team's efforts are both commendable and serve as a potent call to action for policymakers. By drawing attention to these inequities, they are advocating for the rights and welfare of marginalized communities. Their ongoing dedication is poised to resonate with governmental authorities, encouraging meaningful reforms in pension policies. With sustained advocacy and community involvement, there exists a potential for a more promising future where every individual affected by leprosy and disabilities can live with dignity and financial security.
